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Message from the Chair



2017 was the year of the end of an era with the announcement from Premier Wall that he was stepping down after ten years of serving Saskatchewan as its Premier. Premier Wall accomplished much during his tenure but one of the most important achievements was the change of attitude he was able to instill in all of us. People are now positive about Saskatchewan and its role in the country and the world. The increased confidence among Saskatchewan businesses helped Saskatchewan grow into the thriving province that it is today.

We welcome Premier Moe and are looking forward to continuing the good working relationship between the government and the Chamber, as the voice of Saskatchewan business. We are confident that the consultative process that is the cornerstone of business—friendly decisions will only be enhanced with Premier Moe.

The summer of 2017 was a tumultuous time with the announcement by the federal government of proposed tax changes. The changes would have negatively impacted tens of thousands of businesses. It was amazing to see the Chamber network across Canada speak as one voice, a voice that ultimately the federal government could not ignore.

We applaud the development of the "Made in Saskatchewan" climate change strategy. Our members have been firm that the Chamber should continue to support opposing the implementation of a federal carbon pricing program. The Energy Efficiency Task Force formed by the Chamber in the fall of 2016 concluded its recommendations, with the primary objectives to reduce GHG emissions and to increase industry competitiveness. The Chamber continues to advocate for technological investments and incentives to reduce emissions.

Some internal changes were made with bylaw changes to enhance our governance structure. We also made some significant changes to our committee structures, recognizing that changing times means changing demands. We are

moving away from the traditional expert committees and focusing our attention on engaging a representative membership by bringing together experts on key issues within a clearly defined period to create usable advocacy products. We will focus the expertise of our members through 100 day task forces and expert panels to work on key issues as identified in our ongoing strategic plan.

Engagement with our members remains fundamental to the success of our organization and we never forget that it is the voice of our members that we represent. The Chair's Invitational Dinner and the Make a Connection Breakfast are just a few of the events that allow for dialogue and the sharing of expertise among members as well as government officials.

As the largest event celebrating business enterprise in the province, the 34th ABEX Awards once again celebrated Saskatchewan's business excellence on October 21st, 2017 at TCU Place in Saskatoon.

This year's Saskatchewan-themed awards, presented by Conexus Credit Union, saw Saskatchewan's northern businesses receiving many of the awards of the evening. AREVA Resources Canada was inducted into the 'Saskatchewan Business Hall of Fame' while Geoff Gay received the 'Business Leader of the Year' award, and 'Community Leader of the Year' was awarded to Chief Tammy Cook-Searson. As the long-time CEO of the Greater Saskatoon Chamber of Commerce, Kent Smith-Windsor was the 2017 recipient of the Roger Phillips Chamber Builder Award. This award honours an individual who has made significant contributions to the Saskatchewan Chamber network.







Energy Efficiency



The theme of energy efficiency played an integral part in the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce's research and advocacy efforts throughout 2017. In a member survey issued in November 2016, a large majority of those surveyed indicated that reducing greenhouse gas emissions was important. However, respondents also stated that the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce should continue to oppose the implementation of a carbon pricing scheme and instead support technological investments and incentives that reduce emissions.

In response, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce established the Energy Efficiency Task Force in early 2017. The mandate of the Task Force was to create a series of policy recommendations to advance the implementation of energy efficiency measures as a means of achieving meaningful reductions in carbon emissions. Task Force members had specialized knowledge and training in the area of energy conservation and were familiar with a suite of Demand Side Management (DSM) programs offered by utility providers aimed at the commercial-industrial sector.

The Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce continues to maintain that reducing energy consumption per unit of production makes both business and environmental sense, and is an important first step toward tackling climate change in this province.

The Energy Efficiency Strategy was released to the general public in November 2017. The two main objectives of the recommendations were to reduce carbon emissions, and also increasing Saskatchewan industry competitiveness. The responses from those working in the energy management sector have been overwhelmingly positive.

Copies of the full report, along with the executive summary have been received by the Saskatchewan Minister of Energy and Resources, as well as the Minister of the Environment, Dustin Duncan and is also available on the Sask Chamber website. The Chamber will continue to meet with officials from those Ministries to promote the recommendations.

Moving into 2018, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce will continue to build upon the momentum generated by the report's recommendations. As there is currently an immature market in the province for private sector energy management services, the next phase will focus on creating a forum where vendors, service providers, and consulting firms can meet and discuss opportunities for growth and innovation.



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Carbon Pricing and Climate Change Policy

Through its Environment Committee, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce was active in both its research and advocacy efforts on the carbon file for 2017. As indicated in a November 2016 member survey, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce continued to support the provincial government's opposition to the implementation of a federal carbon pricing scheme, and instead advocated for technological investments and incentives to reduce carbon emissions.

Throughout 2017, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce met with officials from both the Saskatchewan Ministry of Environment and Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) to express its concerns.

- In May 2017, the Government of Canada released its technical paper on the federal carbon pricing backstop plan that would be imposed on provinces that did not have their own climate change strategy in place by 2019. As a part of our research and advocacy efforts, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce consulted extensively with large industrial emitters in the province to better understand the economic implications of such a policy. In addition, the Saskatchewan Chamber published a brief summary and analysis of the technical paper that was circulated to members, and submitted formal comments to Environment and Climate Change Canada.
- Also in May 2017, the Chamber met with the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of **Environment and Climate** Change, Jonathan Wilkinson, to discuss the details outlined in the technical paper and to communicate the concerns expressed by our members. In July, the Chamber was granted the opportunity to meet with the Minister of the Environment and Climate Change, Catherine McKenna, along with technical experts from both the Department of Finance and ECCC at the Chamber office in Regina.
- In December 2017, the Government of Saskatchewan released its long-awaited climate change strategy. At the core of the Made-in-Saskatchewan plan is a focus on the use of offsets, performance credits, as well as sector-specific, output-based emissions intensity standards aimed at large emitters. The Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce formally endorsed the Government of Saskatchewan's plan as it is tailored to the province's economic situation and covers a broad range of carbon emissions - all without a direct tax.

Financial Literacy and Youth Entrepreneurship



The Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce (SCC) continued to financially contribute and support the Saskatchewan Financial Literacy Network (SFLN) in 2017.

The SCC also continued its advocacy efforts to persuade the provincial government to create mandatory, stand-alone classes on both financial literacy and youth entrepreneurship within Saskatchewan's K-12 curriculum, with much success.

On March 27, 2018 Deputy Premier and Minister of Education, the Honourable Gord Wyant announced that Financial Literacy will be introduced into the K-12 year. This important step forward for Saskatchewan's youth is a testament to the advocacy efforts of the Chamber and its partner organizations. Chamber members, partners and teachers applauded the Ministry of Education on this announcement and look forward to the implementation of the curriculum in Saskatchewan

The SCC has also continued its financial support of various business student-related events in high schools, colleges, and universities, including the Campbell Business Celebration Night, the Saskatchewan Business Teachers' Association (SBTA) High School Business Case Competition, the Hill Business Dinner, and various activities held by the University of Saskatchewan Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Committee Restructuring

For many decades, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce has utilized expert committees comprised of hardworking volunteers to engage with members, identify and act upon issues of importance to the business community, and create sound policy recommendations. These past efforts are important and have delivered many positive results over the years.

The second half of 2017 brought with it profound changes to the Chamber's policy input process.

Since the Chamber originally formed its expert committees, the ways for Chamber members to interact with committees, as well as with each other, has changed. New communication tools, coupled with members' limited availability to participate in meetings led to a review of the committee structure.

As a result of this review, the Finance. Human Resources. Investment & Growth, and Youth, **Education & Training Expert** Committees no longer meet as of December 31, 2017. In place of these committees, Expert Advisory Panels have been created to focus on select key issues that align with the objectives outlined in the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce's Strategic Plan. Members with expertise on a select key issue are invited to participate on an Expert Advisory Panel. The **Environment Committee is**

continuing in its present form and will lead on the carbon tax files as well as other current and pressing environmental issues.

Furthermore, 100-Day Task Forces will be created on an ad-hoc basis to address issues in real-time, resulting in a report and a series of recommendations. In 2017, the first 100-Day Task Force successfully produced a report on Energy Efficiency.

The Water Council for Saskatchewan, also created in 2017, is continuing in its present form but will move towards being a stand-alone entity in the future.

The Saskatchewan Chamber members have and will continue to play a critical role in identifying key issues and opportunities that may be on the horizon. While member input into the policy-making process will always remain a constant, how the policy process works has been updated. These various changes will serve the Chamber well and will make the policy input process stronger than ever.



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The Fight Against the Federal Tax Changes

On July 18, 2017, the Federal Minister of Finance, Bill Morneau, unveiled draft legislation intended to make changes to planning strategies used by Canadian Controlled Private Corporations (CCPCs).

The three strategies targeted were:

(i) income sprinkling
 (ii) converting a CCPC into
 capital gains, and
 (iii) passive investment income
 held inside a CCPC. In response
 to Minister Morneau's
 announcement, the
 Saskatchewan Chamber of
 Commerce received numerous
 phone calls and emails from
 members on this issue and the
 message was consistently loud
 and clear – the business
 community strongly opposed the
 proposed tax changes.

Throughout the summer, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce's multi-faceted research and advocacy efforts included:

- Consulting with tax planning experts, accountants, and professional services firms.
- Writing a report, Issue in Focus Taxation: Proposed Changes to the Taxation of Private Corporations in Canada, intended to better inform our members.
- Submitting an open letter to Minister Morneau outlining the SCC's concerns and counterrecommendations.

- Meeting with the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Finance, Joël Lightbound in Regina along with other stakeholders.
- Creating an online petition administered through our website that collected responses from 600 employers representing over 15,000 employees.
- Addressing members of the Senate of Canada's Standing Committee on National Finance in Saskatoon in November 2017.

In response to overwhelming criticism, on October 16th Minister Bill Morneau and Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced significant amendments to the earlier proposed measures.

Here are some advocacy wins:

- The Small Business Rate on the first \$500,000 of income will decrease from 10.5% to 9% by 2019.
- The Federal Government will not move forward with limiting access to the indexed Lifetime Capital Gains Exemption.
- The Federal Government is abandoning its plan to curtail the conversion of income to capital gains.

However, the Federal Government is unwisely choosing to go ahead with some of the more controversial measures.

These include:

- The measure to curtail income splitting for family members not deemed by the CRA as active in the business will move forward but the reasonableness test will be simplified.
- The taxation of passive investment income will go ahead, but a new threshold of \$50,000 in income annually will be exempt from the new, higher tax. Draft legislation is anticipated for Federal Budget 2018.

In 2018, the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce will continue to recommend that the Federal Government establish a Royal Commission-type panel to undertake a comprehensive review of the tax system. The business community should be proud of its advocacy efforts around this issue.

The significant amendments made by the Federal Government, along with the Standing Committee on National Finance's final report urging the Federal Government to scrap the tax changes entirely serve as a testament to the power of the Chamber network.

Education Opportunities for Members: Mental Health First Aid, and Domestic Violence and the Workplace

An increased focus on mental health and wellness continues to be a priority for the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce, not only as a business advocacy group but as part of the broader Saskatchewan community.

Creating an environment in the workplace that allows individuals to support each other in times of mental stress is the goal of the Mental Health First Aid training that the Chamber offered to its membership, as presented by Bridges Health. This two-day training, certified by the Mental Health Commission of Canada, focused on recognizing signs of mental distress and providing guidelines and practical examples of what can be done to assist.

Along with a renewed focus on mental health, the Chamber also supported organizations dealing with the effects of domestic violence.

Canada-wide, the losses to employers due to intimate partner violence add up to \$77.9 million and Saskatchewan has the highest rate of reported domestic violence incidents in Canada. Having policies in place to deal with these situations as they affect employees and the workplace can ensure a more productive and permanent workforce, and create stability for affected employees.

With this in mind, the Chamber partnered with PATHS, the Provincial Authority for Transitional Housing Saskatchewan, for two training sessions aimed at providing guidance on the creation of policies for businesses that would provide support structures for employees dealing with intimate partner violence. By creating these support structures, employees feel protected and stable in their workplace and will be able to focus on being productive.

In order to uplift our communities and promote workplace safety, continued focus on mental health and domestic violence is vital. Cities, rural municipalities and northern communities all need support structures in place, offering training opportunities and creating safe platforms for open discussions are an important part in creating a safe business and social environment.

The Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce (SCC) continued to advocate on a variety of items highlighted in its Northern Business Task Force Report from 2014.

The Northern Business Task Force was made up of representatives from companies and organizations that operate in northern Saskatchewan, as well as individuals who have specific knowledge and expertise in the social and economic issues that northern Saskatchewan faces. Through ongoing discussions on current and future issues, the Task Force submitted twelve recommendations focusing on solutions aimed at accelerating northern Saskatchewan's economic and social development.

Additional progress during 2017 included the Saskatchewan Chamber continuing to encourage both SaskPower and the federal government to create new programs to encourage residential and commercial energy efficiency improvements in Saskatchewan's remote northern communities. In February 2017, the SCC created a new 100 Day Energy Efficiency Task Force that issued a report containing a variety of recommendations that would benefit northern Saskatchewan.

While the Government of Saskatchewan has said low commodity prices will not allow them to fund all or part of the Wollaston Lake road, the federal government has indicated that they are very interested in assisting with this project, as it will create a reliable road connection between Wollaston Lake and southern Saskatchewan.

The federal government also announced that communities in Saskatchewan that were eligible for receiving the Nutrition North Canada subsidy would see their subsidy on Level 1 healthy foods increase from \$0.05/kg to \$1.60/kg. This was a significant increase that has brought down food costs in those areas.

Northlands College, Saskatchewan Polytechnic, First Nations University of Canada, and other institutions are continuing to develop new courses that are more focused on the needs of northern businesses and residents.

In late 2015, Industry Canada announced that Saskatchewan would be receiving \$7.42 million through the Connecting Canadians program to expand high-speed internet in northern Saskatchewan communities. SaskTel also contributed \$2.48 million to this project, and by the beginning of 2017, there were 26 communities in northern Saskatchewan with significantly improved high speed internet service.



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Environmental Scan:Ten Demographic and Economic Indicators

The Chamber and its members had what could be called a "mixed" year in 2017. On a positive note, the population continued to grow and the slump in the provincial economy came to an end. Less positively, the slump was not replaced with growth. Instead, the economy went into a kind of holding pattern.

In this summary, ten demographic and economic indicators are used to describe 2017 in Saskatchewan.

Demographic Trends


The Saskatchewan population is growing at a healthy pace. In the year ending October 2017, the population grew at an annual rate of 1.25%. International immigration is the main reason for the increase.

Economic Trends

Economists typically use the gross domestic product after adjusting for inflation (real GDP) to measure economic prosperity. By that measure, Saskatchewan went through a shallow but prolonged recession in 2015 and 2016. Growth in 2017 is estimated at 1.7%.


Four Economic Engines


One way to analyze economic growth is to look at the four engines that make up the GDP. The four engines are consumers, businesses, governments, and out-of-province buyers of our goods and services.



• Consumer spending has recovered from the slowdown in 2015. Retail sales, one of the best indicators of consumer spending, grew by 2.2% in 2016 and 4.0% in 2017. Much of the sales growth in 2017 was the result of a 9.5% increase in unit sales of new motor vehicles.

- Business investment, the second engine, declined for three consecutive years from the peak in 2014 including a drop of 1.0% in 2017. The most recent survey of businesses suggests that capital investment will grow by 0.5% in 2018.
- Government spending slowed in 2017 as the provincial government, the most important of the three levels of government, reduced spending because of lower resource revenues.





 Data on international and interprovincial trade, the fourth engine, are not available but the value of international merchandise trade is a useful proxy. The value of international merchandise exports (net of imports) fell in 2017 for the third consecutive year because of a decline in commodity prices. Continued on page 55.

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




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Environmental Scan: Ten Demographic and Economic Indicators Continued



Employment

The total number of people employed is a useful summary measure that reflects economic activity across all sectors. Employment growth slowed to 0.5% in 2015 and declined by 0.9% in 2016. There was a further, modest (0.2%) decline in 2017.

Personal Income

Adjusted for inflation, personal income after taxes fell in both 2015 and 2016 because of lower employment earnings. The estimate for 2017 is for a modest increase.


Net Farm Income


Agriculture is one of the most important sectors in the economy and net farm income is a useful summary measure of the health of the sector. Net cash income increased at double digit rates in 2014 (+17%) and 2015 (+27%) before falling back slightly in 2016. Preliminary figures suggest an increase of 4% in 2017.

Value of Mineral Sales

The resource sector is another important sector in the provincial economy. The value of mineral sales fell at double-digit rates in 2015 and 2016 from the peak of \$23 billion in 2014. Preliminary data suggests sales in 2017 will be near the 2016 level.
