



Advocacy

PROVINCIAL ADVOCACY

In 2023, our steadfast commitment to advocacy contributed to enhanced business competitiveness and an enriched business climate in Saskatchewan. We facilitated our first Advocacy Day at the Saskatchewan Legislature for our local chambers, providing opportunities to connect and engage with provincial government officials. Chamber representatives had productive discussions with key cabinet ministers, including Hon. Don McMorris, Minister of Government Relations, Labour Relations, and Workplace Safety; Hon. Jim Reiter, Minister of Energy and Resources; Hon. Gordon Wyant, Minister of Advanced Education; Hon. Jeremy Cockrill, then Minister of Highways; Hon. Donna Harpauer, Minister of Finance; Hon. Jeremy Harrison, Minister of Trade and Export Development and Minister of Immigration and Career Training; and Premier Scott Moe. The discussions centered around crucial topics such as infrastructure, critical minerals, labour, energy, and taxes.

Throughout the course of the year, our team worked diligently to advance several key issues relevant to Saskatchewan businesses:

 Opposition to Mandatory Fertilizer Reductions Targets: At the Canadian Chamber's AGM, we proposed a resolution urging the Government of Canada to keep the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions from on-farm fertilizers voluntary. The resolution suggests encouraging emission reduction through incentives and grants, including sequestration. This was adopted with 86% member support.



- Return of the Carbon Tax Proceeds to SMEs: We persistently advocated for the prompt return of Fuel Charge Carbon Tax Proceeds to small businesses in Saskatchewan. In 2023, our efforts included ongoing communication with Ministry of Environment officials, supporting the selection of a program administrator, engaging in discussions with officials in Ottawa, and backing the messaging of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.
- Employment Provisions Review: We responded to the Government of Saskatchewan's request for feedback on *The Saskatchewan Employment Act*, proposing 27 recommendations to enhance employment standards in areas such as work hours, schedules, overtime, tips, youth employment, illness and injury protections, leaves, layoffs, terminations, and foundational definitions of employers and employees.
- Prioritizing Potash and Uranium in Canada's Critical Minerals Strategy: Also at the Canadian Chamber of Commerce AGM, we advocated for the inclusion of potash and uranium in the Government of Canada's list of priority critical minerals. We requested that they receive support and incentives similar to other minerals that are crucial for clean technology.

ADVOCACY AT THE FEDERAL AND GLOBAL LEVEL

Our **Advocacy Day on the Hill** in Ottawa was a milestone for the Saskatchewan Chamber. In November, we hosted a delegation of 13 member businesses, assisting them to engage with leaders from both the Liberal and Conservative parties. Emphasizing the province's commitment to innovation, natural resource development, and sustainability as integral to Canada's success, the delegation conveyed that the province has what the world needs for a prosperous and globally competitive Canada.

Earlier in the year, we were pleased to participate in the **Canadian Chamber of Commerce's Hill Day**, where business leaders from various sectors came together to meet and engage with parliamentarians and government officials to discuss the most pressing policy issues affecting our businesses and the economy.

On the global front, our CEO, Prabha Ramaswamy, along with board chair Jessica Theriault, attended COP28 in Dubai, United Arab Emirates this year. Additionally, Prabha participated in a trade mission to Germany with the Saskatchewan Ministry of Trade and Export Development.

POLICY WINS

- The 2023 Fall Economic Statement revealed that the Government of Canada will enhance the Green Bond Framework to incorporate nuclear energy, a change that has been strongly advocated by the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce.
- 2. In 2016, we initiated efforts to promote financial literacy in the province, culminating in a stakeholder committee's recommendation that the Saskatchewan Ministry of Education mandate financial literacy for Grades 11 and 12. Following incremental changes, including the addition of financial literacy as an elective, we are pleased to announce that our recommendation has been fully implemented this year, making financial literacy a mandatory course prior to graduation.
- 3. Our ongoing advocacy for the Government of Saskatchewan to reassess the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program (SINP) Designated Trades list to include more low-skilled, low-wage positions, achieved success this year. The government expanded the *Existing Work Permit* stream, allowing certain work permit holders in intermediate and lower-skilled occupations in Saskatchewan to apply for permanent residency.

Advocacy

COMMITTEES AND COUNCILS

Our committees and councils are comprised of members from various sectors across the province. Their involvement strengthens our collective influence, shaping a more prosperous future for businesses in Saskatchewan.

- Saskatchewan Labour Market Council (LMC): In 2023, we reconstituted the LMC to help address labour shortages in Saskatchewan. The LMC provides a platform for businesses, training institutions, and the government to collaboratively address challenges, explore opportunities, and find solutions for sustaining Saskatchewan's thriving economy.
- Energy and Environment: Saskatchewan's shift to sustainable energy presents a significant economic opportunity, requiring collaborative partnerships where businesses guide government ambitions. In 2023, the committee monitored and engaged in discussions related to the net-zero target, evaluating all aspects that could transition Saskatchewan to a low-carbon economy.
- Water Council for Saskatchewan: Water is crucial for Saskatchewan's communities, businesses, and the environment. Over the past year, the Water Council for Saskatchewan continued to serve as a central platform for water experts to convene, discussing the state of water in the province and exchanging information and initiatives.

 Chamber of Commerce Executives of Saskatchewan (CCES): CCES acts as a convener for chamber professionals across the province. It facilitates idea exchange, shares best practices, and collectively addresses business issues impacting local communities. This year, CCES continued its regular monthly meetings, and held a virtual fall conference. The conference featured a keynote presentation by Dave Kilby, President Emeritus of the Western Association of Chamber Executives (W.A.C.E.), about 'The ABCs of a Successful Chamber'.

- Saskatchewan Business Council (SBC): Formed in 2017, the SBC serves as a connection hub for provincial business groups. Comprising 18 organizations, the SBC fosters proactive business discussions between CEOs on common priorities, and provides a platform for two-way feedback to the provincial government. In 2023, the SBC was pleased to meet with the Ministry of Trade and Export Development.
- Western Executive Council (WEC): The Canadian Chamber's WEC consists of CEOs dedicated to collaborating with the federal government to enhance the Western Canadian economy. In 2023, our CEO, Prabha Ramaswamy, continued her involvement in this council and had the opportunity to engage in meaningful discussions with various officials, including Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

POLITICAL FORUM

Since 1977, the **Political Forum** has been a cornerstone of our engagement strategy, offering chamber members unique opportunities to connect with elected officials and the premier. On April 20, 2023, our members convened for unmatched networking opportunities and the chance to express opinions directly to Cabinet Ministers, Premier Moe, and members of the Official Opposition.

DEPUTY MINISTER BREAKFAST

In its 15th year, the **Deputy Minister Breakfast** provided chamber members an exclusive opportunity to connect with deputy ministers and Crown corporation CEOs. On June 14, 2023, in Regina, attendees enjoyed an informal breakfast setting with a deputy minister seated at each table, fostering meaningful table conversations. In 2023, the event experienced an outstanding turnout, with representation from nearly every ministry and Crown corporation.

95% of attendees indicated that they are planning to attend this event next year.

CHAIR'S INVITATIONAL DINNER

The **Chair's Invitational Dinner**, held on October 3, 2023, in Regina, was a formal, members-only gathering. It provided business leaders the chance to connect with deputy ministers and Crown corporation CEOs. Distinguished from our other events, this formal dinner offered a refined setting for engaging conversations over dinner. The structured question-and-answer session following dinner allowed participants to pose questions directly to government representatives.



In 2023, 97% of respondents referenced the quality of networking opportunities when asked what they found most valuable about this event.

AGM AND CONFERENCE

Our **AGM and Business Conference** was held in Regina on May 23, 2023. The theme of the event was 'Transportation and Infrastructure: Connecting Saskatchewan to the World'. The conference provided a valuable platform for discussions about positioning Saskatchewan as a global supplier. During this event, Jessica Theriault was sworn in as the Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce 2023-24 Board Chair.

Indigenous Engagement Charter







The Indigenous Engagement Charter, originally launched in 2020, underwent an update in 2023. The refreshed version of the Charter boasts a new structure, grouping the overarching 'pillars' with tangible actions and examples to help signatories act on their commitments.

The Charter now has incorporated the seven sacred teachings into each of the pillars. The seven sacred teachings are originated from the Anishinaabe people and have been adopted by many First Nations, Metis and Inuit Peoples. These seven teachings are guiding principles for building mutually respectful relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples.

The Seven Sacred Teachings

We strive for a Saskatchewan where **respect** is shown to all, **honesty** fosters trust, **truth** is spoken with integrity, **love** guides our relationships, **courage** leads us to embrace change, **wisdom** guides our decisions, and **humility** shapes our actions.
